

Another attack advertisement in the 2000 Ohio Supreme Court race featured Justice Alice Robie Resnick as Lady Justice sneaking a

peek at cash tipping the scales of justice. As in O'Neill's situation, the ad was not successful and she was re-elected.

But the idea that justice is for sale is more perception than reality in Ohio, said William Weisenberg, assistant executive director of public affairs and government relations with the Ohio State Bar Association.

"The perception is because people don't understand the system," Weisenberg said. "The judiciary has been described by some as the least understood branch of government."

The Ohio Code of Judicial Conduct requires judge candidates to abstain from political activity that is "inconsistent with the independence, integrity or impartiality of the judiciary." That includes not holding office in a political party or stumping for another candidate.

Judicial candidates are prohibited from personally soliciting or receiving campaign contributions, according to the code.

Still, the infusion of cash from political parties and interest groups to judges' campaigns can raise questions about whether they can be impartial when donors become parties in lawsuits, said Bert Brandenburg, executive director of Justice at Stake.

"Judges are starting to look indistinguishable from other politicians. We don't want our judges to be politicians in robes," said Alicia Bannon, an author of the report.

Most people who donate to judicial candidates give based on the candidate's philosophy, be that following the letter of the law or considering policy and public opinion. That might give the perception that philosophy is influenced by the money, but that's rarely the case, Weisenberg said. Judges will recuse themselves from a case if they feel they cannot be impartial.

Weisenberg's solution: educate the electorate about how cases work and what experience judges have. Then the public might be less inclined to believe an attack ad.

Spending on judicial elections has skyrocketed in the past decade, leaving some questioning whether justice is for sale, according to a new national report.

An estimated \$56.4 million was spent on judicial elections nationwide in 2011-12, according to the report by Justice at Stake, the Brennan Center for Justice at NYU School of Law and the National Institute on Money in State Politics.
